COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course looks at the historical, social and political development of the Middle East from the end of the Ottoman Empire to the present day. This course aims to contextualize contemporary debates within a historical overview of the Middle East, as well as provide the conceptual tools to understand the workings of regional and international powers.

TEACHING METHODS

This class will be taught using a mixture of lectures, class discussions, and presentations. Students are expected to make their contribution through regular class participation critically assessing the reading assignments, responding to peer comments and presentations, and discussing the ideas and arguments presented in class. It is essential that all students participate actively in the discussions, which is a crucial element of the course.

LEARNING OUTCOMES AND OBJECTIVES

By the end of the course students should be:

- Familiar with the chronology, concepts and analytical tools applied to the region
- Aware and able to engage with some of the different perspectives and debates within the field
